

FY06 Infrastructure Protection Program Overview

The FY06 DHS Infrastructure Protection Program (IPP)

- The game
 - Interim National Infrastructure Protection Plan
 - National Strategy for Transportation Security
 - National Strategy for Maritime Security
- \$175 million appropriated
- \$7 million for DHS Expenses
- \$168 million for Grants

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Eligible Applicants

- The Fight
 - FY'05 allowed 66 eligible ports
 - FY'06 G&T agreed to 100, Secretary's Office changed it to 78
- We won
- Initial eligibility expanded to include the Nation's 100 most critical port areas (as defined by USCG), which represent 95% of foreign waterborne commerce. In addition, An additional port area of eligibility from FY '05 was maintained for continuity purposes
- Additional Eligibility
 - Facilities within a 2-mile radius of the port-area's commercial waterway.
 - Facilities that fall outside the 2-mile radius, but are included in the port area's AMSP, will also be eligible to apply for funding
- All projects will continue to be evaluated based on each port area's

Eligible Applicants – cont'd.

Within the eligible ports, applicants must be:

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- Owners/operators of federally regulated public or private ports, terminals, U.S. inspected passenger vessels, or ferries as defined in the Maritime Transportation Security Act (MTSA) 33 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Parts 101, 104, and 105
- Port authorities or other State and local agencies that provide layered security protection to federally regulated facilities (layered security means an approach that utilizes prevention and detection capabilities of organizations within a port-wide area to provide complete security solutions to regulated entities)
- Consortia composed of local stakeholder groups (i.e., river groups, ports, and terminal associations) representing federally regulated ports,
 terminals, U.S. inspected passenger vessels, or ferries

Eligible Applicants – cont'd.

- 25% cash match of total project cost required of Public applicants.
- 50% cash match of total project cost required of Private applicants
- Exceptions:
 - If project cost is LESS than \$25,000
 - If applicant determines "Higher level of (Federal) support is required", an appeal can be made to the Secretary
- Ferry Systems participating in the FY06 Transit Security Grant Program (TSGP) cannot apply for funding for projects already under consideration for TSGP Funding



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Application Process and Timeline

- The grants guidance was announced and released Thursday, July 6, 2006.
 - Applicants MUST now apply via Grants.gov at <u>www.Grants.gov</u>.
 - Application Period July 6-August 4, 2006.Applications must be received by 11:59 PM on August 4
 - It is recommended that applicants register with Grants.gov no less than FIVE DAYS prior to the close of the application period.
 - Awards will be made by Sept. 30, 2006.



Program Announcement

- Posted on <u>www.grants.gov</u>
- Program application/solicitation kit generally includes:
 - Specifics of program (funding, allocations, etc.)
 - Allowable/unallowable costs
 - Criteria for scoring, if applicable
 - Required application elements
 - How/where to apply
 - Registration deadline (if applicable)
 - Application deadline





- Grants.gov provides a single, secure and reliable source for applying for Federal grants online, simplifying the grant application process and reducing paperwork.
- All applicants must complete the Grants.gov registration process before any grant application package can be submitted.
- After reading the appropriate guidance, the application process requires four steps:
 - Step 1: Download a grant application package and application Instructions
 - Step 2: Complete the selected grant application package
 - Step 3: Submit a completed grant application package
 - Step 4: Track the status of a completed grant application package
- Help screens are available throughout the online grant application process.



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PSGP Method of Selection

Selection Method	Details
Grant Application and Administration	 Eligible applicants in each eligible port area may submit one application for funding of up to five (5) individual projects All applicants will submit their applications directly to Grants.gov Funding may be awarded for all, some or none of the projects submitted based on the outcome of the evaluation process
Initial Application Review Process	 TISD, G&T staff will conduct an initial review of all applications Ineligible, incomplete and duplicate applications will be eliminated from further consideration Applications passing this review will be grouped by port area and provided to the applicable USCG COTP for further review



PSGP Method of Selection (cont'd)

Selection Method	Details
Field Review Process	 USCG COTP will review applications in coordination with MARAD Region Director and applicable State Administrative Agency or Agencies and Homeland Security Advisors (HSAs) (where feasible) to validate eligibility of applicant based on 33 CFR Parts 101, 102, 104, and 105 USCG COTP& MARAD will prioritize eligible applications from their respective ports using risk-based national port security priorities The USCG COTP will submit a prioritized listing of projects for each port area to G&T for the national review process



PSGP Method of Selection (cont'd.)

Selection Method	Details
National Review Process	 A national review panel will be convened. Members will include representatives of G&T, USCG, TSA, CBP, OIP and MARAD Following the initial meeting, G&T will evaluate the top projects from each COTP list for each port area against a formula considering: Relationship of the projects to one or more of the National Priorities: National Port Security Priorities The National Preparedness Goal COTP ranking Location of project (based on port area's risk-based ranking) The national review panel will then evaluate and validate the consolidated and ranked project list Awards will be made based on the final ranked list of projects identified by the national review panel



National Review Evaluation Criteria

G&T will evaluate the top projects from each COTP list for each port area against a formula that considers the following factors:

- The COTP ranking (based on each COTP's prioritized list of projects)
- The location of the project (based on the port area's risk-based ranking)
- Relationship of the project to one or more of the national port security priorities:
 - Prevention and detection of IED attacks by small craft
 - Prevention and detection of vehicle-borne IEDs on ferries
 - Prevention and detection of underwater IED attacks
 - Enhancement of port's Maritime Domain Awareness (TWIC Included)
- Relationship of the projects to one or more of the National Priorities outlined in the National Preparedness Goal



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Planned Roles in the FY06 Grant Process

COTPs

- Lead field reviews
 - Ensure consistent application of guidance
- Complete data forms:
 - Port Area Project Priority List
 - Field Review Sheet
- MARAD Region Directors
 - Assist COTPs with Field Review

SAAs

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 The Field Review Process will be conducted by the cognizant USCG COTP, in coordination with applicable State Administrative Agency or Agencies (where feasible) to ensure alignment with State and Urban

FY'07

- \$200 million passed in the House bill
- \$210 million passed out of full Homeland Security Senate Committee
- On the Floor of the Senate an amendment by Sen. Byrd passed appropriating an additional \$190 million for PSGP
- The bills now go to Conference for reconciliation
- Likely passage in early September
